II. David reacts to the news of Saul's death. v. 1-16

How would you respond if your worst enemy finally got what is coming to him?

- A. David is still in Philistine territory (Ziklag) when he learns about Saul's death. v. 1
- B. An Amalekite messenger brings news of Israel's defeat and Saul's death. v. 2-9
 - 1. Why has this man come to David? v. 2
 - 2. The Amalekite claims to have finished off Saul (mercy killing). v. 5-10
 - 3. Is this Amalekite telling the truth? I Sam. 31:5-6
 - 4. David's response to this news is totally unexpected.
- C. David leads his men in mourning over Saul, Jonathan and Israel. v. 11-12 I Sa. 4:12
- D. David executes the man who was 'dying' to say that he killed Saul. v. 13-16
 - 1. David judges him by his own testimony. v. 13-14,16 I Sam. 24:6 26:9ff 31:4
 - 2. This is not the only time in which David responds in an unexpected way to news of an enemy's death. 3:26ff 4:9ff 18:19ff
- E. David is shown to have obtained his kingdom honorably.
- F. Jesus, David's greater Son, also gains the kingdom honorably without grasping inappropriately. Phil. 2:5ff Mt. 4:1ff
- G. Application.
 - 1. We are not authorized by God to participate in euthanasia (so-called mercy killing). Ex. 20:13 Gen. 9:5-6
 - 2. Rather trying to advance yourself, trust God to exalt you as and when He sees fit.
 - 3. May God give us honorable rulers who fear Him instead of opportunistic, power hungry and manipulative leaders.
 - 4. Be sure your sin will find you out. Acts 5:1ff Luke 12:2-3 Ro. 2:16
 - 5. Respect those whom God has placed in authority over you. I Pe. 2:17ff Ro. 13:7 Heb. 13:17 Eph. 6:1ff

III. David laments the deaths of Saul and Jonathan. v. 17-27

- A. David expresses what is on his heart by composing an elegy. v. 17-18 3:13ff Je. 9:17ff
- B. David's ode to Saul and Jonathan: heroes of Israel. v. 19-27
 - 1. Theme: How the mighty have fallen. v. 19
 - 2. Sorrow over the loss of mighty leaders. v. 20-24
 - a. Silence the blasphemous joy of the Philistines. v. 19-20 I Sam. 31:9 Ps. 94:3
 - b. A curse be on Mount Gilboa where Saul, the anointed king fell. v. 21 Am 1:2
 - c. Saul and Jonathan fought valiantly and died bravely. v. 22-23
 - d. Saul brought stability and prosperity to Israel. v. 24 14:47ff 18:6-7 Pr. 31:21
 - 3. Sorrow over the loss of a dear friend, Jonathan, v. 25b-26 Ps. 133:1
 - a. Jonathan was a faithful covenant brother to David. 18:1-4 20:1ff 23:16ff
 - b. His love for David was unsurpassed.
 - c. Does verse 26 imply anything romantic or sexual about the relationship between David and Jonathan? Isa. 63:9 Jer. 31:3
 - 4. Conclusion: How have the mighty fallen. v. 27

- C. David shows himself to be a worthy leader of God's people.
 - 1. He is neither vengeful nor grasping.
 - 2. He exhibits a generous spirit by celebrating that which is praiseworthy about Saul while ignoring his faults.
 - 3. He is zealous for the LORD's honor. Ps. 79:10 94:3ff 69:9

D. Application.

- 1. Are you gracious to your enemies? Mt. 5:43ff Luke 7:27–28 Pr. 24:17-18 17:5
- 2. There is a time to mourn. 3:31 Ecc. 3:4 I Sam. 25:1 Ge. 23:2 Jo. 11:35f Mt. 5:4
- 3. How should we memorialize the death of an unbeliever? Phil. 4:8-9 Eph. 4:29,25
 - a. Thank God for the common grace blessings we have received from our unbelieving loved one.
 - b. We don't have to bring up their sins and failures or their likely destiny.
 - c. We are not authorized, however, to lie! Eph. 4:25
 - d. We also can use the death of an unbeliever as an opportunity for evangelism.
- 4. Being honest doesn't mean saying everything which we could say. Eph. 4:29
- 5. Music is a powerful means of expressing both truth and emotion.
- 6. True loving friendship is a rare and precious blessing. Pr. 17:17 27:6
- 7. The righteous often don't receive their reward in this life.

IV. Concluding applications.

- A. If such a wonderful song can be composed about King Saul and his son Jonathan, how much more gloriously should we praise King Jesus!
 - 1. He is most beautiful and pleasant. v. 19,26b Song. 5:10 Isa. 4:2
 - 2. His death was both heroic and tragic -- the Mighty One fell. v. 19 Zech. 12:10,12
 - a. The wicked who rejoiced in His death, thinking they had triumphed, later fell under judgment. v. 20
 - b. His death caused physical upheaval. v. 21 Mt. 27:54 Mark 15:33
 - c. In His death, the enemy fell slain. v. 22b Gen. 3:15
 - 3. He kept covenant for us, renouncing His rights for our good. v. 26a I Sam. 18:1-4 Phil. 2:5ff
 - 4. His love is better than romantic love. v. 26b John 15:13 I Jo. 4:10 Rom. 8:35ff
- B. Jesus invites you to be His friend.
 - 1. Don't let your end be like that of Saul or the Amalekite, both of whom failed to honor the LORD.
 - 2. You are invited to a memorial service for Jesus tonight. I Cor. 11:24ff
