## THE STORY OF JOSEPH'S BROTHERS' SIN

I. What their actions are to teach us II. How their actions are repeated

## I. WHAT THEIR ACTIONS ARE TO TEACH US?

- A. Rarely have such evil been done as what they did to their brother
  - 1. Not every sin we do is marked as black as others: vs. 18-36
    - a. done consciously: vs. 18
    - b. done in mockery: vs. 19
    - c. done despite pleading: vs. 21-22
    - d. done callously: vs. 23-24 (Gen. 42:21-22)
    - e. done selfishly: vs. 25-28
    - f. done hypocritically: vs. 34-35
- B. Sin is like a slippery road: sin always multiplies
  - 1. Brothers began with rejecting Joseph's example and rebuke (vs. 2) a. sin rebuke rejected is first step onto Cain's road (Gen. 4:5-8)
    - b. worst sins are religious murder (Matt. 23:34-39)
  - 2. If you detect this sin, heed God's call to Cain: Gen. 4:7
- C. The brother's rejection of Joseph was *rejection of Jacob's love* 1. Joseph would have shared *why he came* to them (Gen. 37:13-14)
  - 2. Their response points to the blackest sin in our life: Matt. 11:20-24

## II. HOW THEIR ACTIONS ARE REPEATED AMONG HEARERS OF THE GOSPEL?

- A. Jesus' preached *Law and Gospel mixed with prayer* (Matt. 11:7-30)
  1. Note His increasing sharpness in His preaching
  - a. He clearly singles out 'three groups of people among audience' as an example of 'separating the precious from the vile'

- b. The message Jesus brings is striking hard and deep: 21, 23
  - His ministry left clear evidences of His power and glory
  - yet His ministry did nothing to most of them
- c. The Lord makes it clear what sins are blackest to Him: 21-24
- d. The Lord Jesus always preached viewing the judgment: 22, 24

**EXAMINATION & REFLECTION**: Who are the worst sinners in this world? A. The one we think off are not the ones Jesus sees before Him!

- B. What are we to then about this awful reality?1. It is a call for all God's people to pray like Jesus did (vs. 25)
  - 2. It is a call to confess God right in all He does (vs. 26-27)
  - 3. It is a call to all who are unsaved to hasten to Christ (vs. 28-30) a. believe that Joseph's brethren/Chorazin etc. is your picture
    - b. believe that despite all our wrong, Christ truly invites us who live unconverted – unsaved – burdened with all aspect of God's curse
      - what a terrible reality it is to be unconverted!
      - what a sweet tiding it is that He is a complete Savior even to those who are like Bethsaida, Chorazin, Capernaum and Joseph's brethren

This is a faithful saying and worthy of all acceptation, that Christ Jesus came into the world to save sinners; of whom I am chief. 1 Tim. 1:15
