This evening we come to understand the Lord's Prayer – and especially, to pray with know Him as "our Father which art in heaven" as we bring to Him our cares tonight.


Pray...

- With a serious meditation on what it means that God is your Father as He has not only created you, but also adopted you into His household.
- With a serious meditation on what it means that God is OUR Father as we consider ourselves a portion of the body of Christ as a congregation.
- With a serious meditation on what it means that God is in Heaven as we focus
 on the glory of God, being heavenly minded, and seeking the glory which awaits.
- For the Lord to heal the nation's deep divisions through a revival of faith in Jesus Christ (Galatians 3:28).
- For protection for the magistrates and police who are trying to keep order against growing lawlessness (Romans 13:4-5), and that justice would prevail in those areas where there are injustices in our nation (Psalm 33:5).
- For protection from the coronavirus (Psalm 91:3), and that it would abate.
- For a competent portion of those things we need in this life (Matthew 6:11), including food, work, and covering.
- For the Lord to raise up ministers of the gospel to go into the harvest (Matthew 9:38).
- Pray that the Lord would preserve our congregation's lampstand (Rev 2:5) and witness to McKinney, especially in our transition.
- Pray for the church as she is persecuted and that she would have a godly witness (Matthew 5:10). Pray that the church in our nation would not be persecuted so we could live godly lives (1 Timothy 2:2).
- Pray for the increase of Christ's Kingdom over the earth (Matthew 6:10).
- Pray for our congregation, that we would walk as befitting the sons and daughters of light (Ephesians 5:8), that the world would perceive us as His children and give glory to God.
- Pray for our families, that the Lord would preserve our families and call all of
 the covenant children to Himself (Acts 2:38), that they would not depart from
 the way in which they should go (Proverbs 22:6), and provide godly spouses for
 them.
- Thank Christ for His great care for us (Luke 22:40, 45) and for fulfilling all righteousness (Matthew 3:15) on our behalf.
