- a. Two to three months is the estimate of the time it took the wise men to travel from the east to Jerusalem. Their arrival triggered Herod's fear of a political rival.
- b.Since Jesus was led to the wilderness immediately after being baptized he must have returned to where John was baptizing after the temptation for the events described in John ref-ref. Though we would not get this impression from Luke 4:12 and Matthew 4:
- c. The them, referring to His disciples includes only Andrew, Simon (Peter), Phillip, Nathaniel, and likely John.
- d. The precise chronological location of the Sermon on the mount is difficult to determine. Matthew places it *prior* to the healing of Peter's mother-in-law (see 8:14). If Matthew is following strict chronological oder then it must be somewhere in period "q". But it's not clear that he always follows such order and there seems to be little time for it to fit in "q". Period "r" seems more likely. If we assume Matthew's sermon on the mount is a separate occasion from Luke's sermon on the plain then "r" is a likely period. If the two are the same event then Luke's location is most likely.

- f. In their narratives Mark and Matthew include the reception at Levi's home immediately after his calling but the reception didn't occur until sometime later. See event z.
- g.Assuming Mark is reporting in chronological order (except for Matthew's reception, see note f) the scene of going through the grain fields follows Matthew's calling. Also where the controversy with the Pharisees took place is uncertain, however Mt. 12:9 indicates it did not take place in the synagogue.
- h. For "plain" see Lk. 6:17, similar to sermon on the mount, Mt. 5-7. Some think that the sermon here is a reduced report of Matthew 5-7. But the circumstances appear different enough to justify that this is a similar sermon given on another occasion during the great Galilean ministry.

- i. The reason I've placed Matthew's banquet here is because in Matthew's account it immediately precedes the raising of Jairus' daughter (assuming Matthew did place these two events in chronological order, see Mt. 9:18). Mark's chronology of raising Jairus' daughter is followed in my ordering of events.
- j. It doesn't seem possible to know when during the great Galilean ministry Jesus went to Nain. Luke is the only gospel which records it. The visit to Nain and Nazareth are sequenced here simply because they are geographically close. Pure conjecture.

k.Either while in Nain? or Capernaum?

1. Luke 10:10-15 occurs during Jesus giving instructions to the 70 he is sending out. This appears to be a different occasion than Matthew 11:20-30 which is addressed to a group in a public setting. Mark does not contain either occasion.

m.See note j.

- n.Transition 29 and 30 and event ac are not intended to represent actual historical location in the sequence of events. We know that Jesus attended a Jerusalem feast (Jn. 5:1) prior to the feeding of the 5000, thus prior to Mark 6:32-45 (see event ae). John 6:4 simply states that the passover was near. None of the synoptics mentions Jesus' attendance at this feast (Jn. 5:1) but he must have traveled from Galilee to Jerusalem and back (as shown in the chart)
- o."Jesus and the Twelve withdraw from an undisclosed location on the western shore of the lake and go by boat to a deserted area. Where the feeding of the five thousand occurred we do not know, but the hill country north of Capernaum and west of Bethsaida (see Luke 9:10) is a reasonable suggestion." The Gospel according to Mark, Pillar Series, James R. Edwards.
- p."Although Luke says they went to the town (my comment- unless you use the TR text, which adds a deserted place near Bethsaida) he has a tendency to simply refer to the nearest town, i.e. they were in a deserted place with Bethsaida as the nearest town." (Add commentary reference-forgot who mentioned this)
- q.I see no means of reconciling John's account of what happened after the feeding of the 5000 which has Jesus and the disciples ending up at Capernaum (Jn. 6:16-17, 59) on the *day after* feeding the 5000 (Jn. 6:22) and Jesus walking on water (Jn. 6:17-21), with Mark and Matthew's account of them heading for Bethsaida (Mk. 6:45, Mt. says "other side") but due to the storm landing at Gennesaret (Mk. 6:53, Mt. 14:34). Neither do Matthew and Mark leave any time for the bread of life discourse in the synagogue at Capernaum on the day after the crossing the sea incident. Is it possible they traveled between Capernaum and Gennesaret during the day after the sea crossing incident?

Also when they leave the feeding site and head for Capernaum by boat they must be intending to go from East to west across the northern end of the sea and doing this by boat avoids them having to cross the Jordan? If the feeding was on the east of the Jordan how did the 5000 get there in the first place?
