The Roar of the Lion, the Promise of the King 1 Peter 5:8-11 Reading: John 10:1-18

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The OT indicates he was formed in the very earliest hours of creation: rising in splendor, then falling in disgrace & defeat almost immediately.

He slithered into the **Garden**, deceiving our first mother & father: "*Has God said*?"

He accused faithful **Job** in courts of God, then unleashed his malice on the unsuspecting ancient. Job bent, but didn't break. "*Does Job serve God for nothing*?"

He sifted poor **Peter** like wheat. Despite the apostle's protest, his thrice repeated denial in the courtyard came within hours.

His evil messenger pressed suffering but praying **Paul** like thorn in the flesh.

He dared to tempt even the **Son of Man Himself**, over & over in our Lord's forty days of fasting the wilderness, to no effect.

The **predator of our souls** has been on the prowl ever since the dawn of time.

Turn w/ me and follow along in your NT as I read 1 Peter 5:8-11.

We draw near the end of this letter...

Peter's epistle has traced a path paved, at times, with *refining trials, fiery ordeals, stern warnings, difficult circumstances & relationships*. He calls us to *suffer & submit & stand firm*.

But not until now, at the *very end of his letter*, does the apostle name the *prince of this world* – the *enemy of our soul*.

Yet don't miss this beloved: Peter's *final warning* is not Peter's *final word*! Who remains the hope & the hero of our epistle, right up to the very end? *The God of grace & glory*!

And so, although we need to *be on the watch* for our age-old enemy, we must *never take our eyes* off of our great God & King!

Peter's last two commands for gospel pilgrims:

- 1. Pay attention! ... Your path leads through enemy territory. (vv. 8-9)
- 2. Take hope! ... Your path leads to eternal glory. (vv.10-11)

Pay attention! This path your on can be dangerous... (vv. 8-9)

- 1. Peter's *final warning* (v. 8) is a *brief & brassy* **bugle's blast**.
 - a. Peter is about to draw His letter *across the line*. He can't afford to let these dear saints slip into *complacency*.
 - b. He grabs his friends' attention with a *terse*, *two word sentence*.
 - a. Even though Peter has shifted a gears from vv. 5-7, he doesn't employ any of the *normal nice transition words* we like to see: → *therefore*, *for*, *then*, *that*, *but*, *and*.
 - b. Just two pressing Greek imperatives.
 - c. **Two** urgent commands, held together by **one** common theme: *vigilance*.
 - c. *You be sober* the idea of course is to be *self-controlled*, and therefore *unclouded* (*unimpaired*) in your *thinking* & *judgment*.
 - a. This isn't the *first time* Peter's sounded this note!
 - b. 1:13 Therefore, prepare your minds for action, keep sober in spirit, fix your hope completely on the grace to be brought to you at revelation of Jesus Christ.
 - **c.** 4:7 *The end of all things is at hand; therefore, be of sound judgment and sober spirit* for the purpose of prayer.
 - d. *You be on the alert* Peter pictures someone who is *awake* & *active* & *watching* for any threat.
 - a. Like a *soldier* stationed on the perimeter.
 - b. Or a *traveler* on a dark & unfamiliar trail, *straining* to catch a *glimpse*, or hear *sound*, of any possible *threat* just off the path.

- And then, there he is! That movement in the brush; that deep-throated roar, so close you can feel the sound & smell his vile breath. Peter is right! Your enemy's been spotted. (small pause)
 - a. Let's *i.d.* who we're looking for! Peter uses two words (v. 8):
 - a. *Adversary enemy*. It brings the idea of an *accuser*. And he's not just *any* enemy *the enemy*. The big, bad one!
 - b. *Devil* (from the *Greek* word that was used to translate the *Hebrew* word *Satan*). It means *slanderer*.
 - b. Do you believe in the Devil? Peter believed in the devil (Jesus...)!
 - a. Many people who profess to believe in **God** & say they believe in **Jesus**, think it's *outdated* & *unsophisticated* to believe in a real *supernatural* & *malevolent personality*.
 - b. Satan loves it when you think he's a superstitious myth!
 - i. When we first moved to California, we had a *lesson* or two to learn about our new *neighborhood*!
 - 1. Just several weeks after we *settled in,...*
 - 2. On a bright, sunny *morning*,...
 - 3. Joanie & some of the kids were sitting in the *living room*, heads in the *books* & working on *school*...
 - 4. When Joanie looked out the *front window* and into the *front yard*, and there went Nathan's **bike**...being pushed by a young teenager that *wasn't a Bowen*.
 - 5. We'd left the *garage door up* it hadn't been a problem in *Oklahoma*!
 - 6. We got the *bike back* and we *learned* to be *a little more alert*!
 - ii. When you think the neighborhood is *safe*, you leave your *windows open*...and your *doors unlocked*.

- c. The devil is *real*, and he is on he on the *prowl*, *roaring* as he goes.
 - a. Lit. *walking about*; picture is this ravenous beast on the *prowl*, on the *hunt*.
 - b. His roar is angry & vicious. Satan's roar is the...
 - i. ...skeptical questioning of a former, pagan friend.
 - ii. ...taunting of reviling coworkers.
 - iii. ... harsh words of a grinding supervisor.
 - iv. ...*unfeeling indifference* of a unconverted & unsympathetic *spouse*.
- d. The lion's roar is designed to *paralyze* you with confusion & fear so he can *smell you out* & *hunt you down* & *gobble you up*.
 - a. My NASB says he is *seeking someone to devour* The vocabulary is literally to *drink down* like a *gulp*.
 - b. Beloved, your adversary wants *find you* and *eat you for lunch*. He wants to drag you *off the pilgrim path* and into the *brush*. He wants to *kill* you.
- 3. Your orders are *clear* & they are *powerful*. They are the trumpet blast of vigilance & victory!
 - a. Peter's *third* urgent command (v.9): *resist him*. It's an *active* idea!
 - a. Isn't it interesting: the Bible orders you to *flee* from sin, but to *stand & resist* Satan.
 - b. That's the idea everywhere we encounter the devil in the **NT:** *buckle on your armor, stand your ground, think clearly.*

- b. Here is where the Lord wants you to *make your stand*: stand *firm* (*shoulder to shoulder*) on *the Gospel*; literally, *the faith*. Here's *how*, in the context of the 1st Century world Peter lived in:
 - a. Don't let **anyone** or **anything** *push you off* God's truth. The promise of *forgiveness* & *life* & *eternal glory* in Jesus Christ. Fill your mind with the Gospel; God's truth.
 - b. Don't let **anything** in this world so *discourage you* (so *distract you*) that you *turn back* from the pilgrim way.
- c. Here is some **encouraging news**: *you aren't standing alone* (all of Peter's commands here are *plural*)! You have *comrades in arms*, they are *experiencing* what you are *experiencing*, and **they are winning**!
 - After all, as James writes, when *you resist the devil*, the *devil will flee from you*. (4:7)

Brothers & sisters in Jesus, there is so much to dishearten & confuse you.

Be vigilant, Satan is real & Satan prowls & Satan roars: stand against him, shoulder to shoulder, on the Gospel.

<u>Read vv. 10-11</u>: What a shout of hope! Our path leads to eternal glory.

- 1. One of my commentaries pointed out that here at the close of his letter, Peter pulled together several his major talking points.
 - a. I guess the apostle just wanted to *remind* his friends, *one last time*, of some of *the most important truths* in his letter.
 - b. Do you see them here? necessary suffering, purposeful refining, divine calling, eschatological deliverance, eternal inheritance, God glory, & God's grace.
- 2. The most prominent of *Peter's final truths* is this (v. **10**): your God is the true God from Whom *all grace pours*.
 - a. Vv. **10 & 11** have a *connection* back to vv. **8 & 9** (Gr. *and*), and that connection emphasizes a *glorious contrast*.
 - i. The difference between our *enemy* & our *friend*.
 - ii. The difference between Satan & God.
 - iii. Satan He wants to *devour* you. Your enemy is the father of *lies & accusations & deception & death*. God gives you *eternal life* thru faith & repentance in Christ. God is the fount of *all grace*.
 - b. What does God's grace look like? Grace is like getting an unimaginable wonderful gift, just when you've been acting your very worst. *"Grace is undeserved favor bestowed upon us in our unworthiness."* (Hiebert)

- c. Peter focuses on *two fundamental expressions* of God's grace towards sinners:
 - i. 1st God's grace that called you. Peter loves this idea of God's call of election. Reminders of election & predestination & calling started all the way back in 1:1 and have been woven by the Holy Spirit throughout Peter's encouragements all the way to these closing notes.
 - 1. Beloved, (v. **10**) if you *in Christ* this morning it is only because the *God of all grace* has called you to Himself.
 - 2. Can you turn & read 1:3 out loud w/ me?
 - ii. 2nd God's grace that will deliver you
 - 1. Look at the middle of **v. 10** closely. Peter doesn't simply say that God called you forgiveness or salvation or the start of a new life.
 - 2. The Scriptures look far out & beyond the day God gave you faith, and see faith's final goal: eternal glory.
 - 3. There is a wonderful guarantee in the apostle's words: God's grace not only puts you on the pilgrim path of life, it absolutely guarantees you'll reach the glorious end of the road!
 - 4. Grace from *eternity past* to *eternal glory*!

- 3. But there *is* a **path** that God leads you through. God's way is a *refining, sanctifying path*.
 - a. Peter doesn't whitewash anything: the *path to glory* inevitably includes *suffering*.
 - a. Suffering seems *inevitable* if you read 1 Peter *carefully & honestly*.
 - b. *But suffering is not forever*. It may seem long. And we must say with honesty that it may span a lifetime. But we are on *God's timetable* here, and suffering *isn't* forever.
 - b. Then Peter paves the way to glory with *four future-tense* verbs. By God's grace, these *four promises* will follow *Christian suffering*. The *God of all grace* will Himself:
 - a. *Perfect you* to bring to completion. You & I say, "*I* don't know if I'm going to make it..."; the God of all grace says, "I won't allow you to fall short."
 - b. Confirm you to shore-up, to set in a support (pillar); You & say, "I'm not sure I can take any more of this opposition. I'm just about ready to throw in the towel on all this 'Jesus stuff." God says, "I won't leave you out there w/o help."
 - c. Strengthen you We say, "The enemy is cruel & powerful." God says, "I'll strengthen you to resist & overcome."
 - d. Establish you To place on a foundation. When we say, "I'm about to swept away!" The God who is gracious & pours out grace promises this: "I will set you on Solid Rock!"

Never fear, He is the God of all grace, from eternity past to eternal glory!

V. 11 - To Him be dominion forever & ever. Amen!

- 1. He just makes you want to break out in worship, doesn't He!?!
 - a. Your God possesses *eternal (forever & ever) power*! (That's the *point* in v. **11**).
- 2. The enemy is *cunning & malicious*, but when you *stand*, He finally *flees*.
- 3. God has promised to *refine* you & bring you to His *glory*. He's *promised*! *That's grace*!
- 4. Amen! We believe!

...*pray*...

Response:

Brothers & sisters in Christ! We can't whitewash the suffering, but we're going to make it! God is *faithful &* full of *grace* – heaven awaits! Follow Him & worship Him!

But do you see those two big words in the middle of v. 10: in Christ. These promises of grace are for men & women & boys & girls who are in Christ.

In Christ because you've felt the burden of your sinfulness before a good & holy God.

In Christ because you believe that God's Son, perfect & divine, died on the cross carrying *your* sins.

In Christ because you know God raised Jesus from the grave – He is alive right now, and He is your Lord.

In Christ because you follow Him by faith & grace day by day.
