Seminar Description

The Quest for Corporate Harmony in the Church will explore what Scripture has to say regarding the biblical exhortation for harmony in the Body of Christ and keys to achieving corporate fellowship, agreement and like-mindedness. This paradoxical incongruity will be addressed in this seminar and helpful biblical disciplines explored and applied. This seminar will seek to show how we can turn conflicting grievances into complimentary grace, thus achieving harmony in the church.

The String Section

Characteristics

- Individually
- Complimentary

The strings are the largest family of instruments in the orchestra and they come in four sizes: the violin, which is the smallest, viola, cello, and the biggest, the double bass, sometimes called the contrabass.



The Woodwind Section

Characteristics

- Individually
- Complimentary
- Variety

The modern orchestra's woodwind section typically includes: flutes, oboes, clarinets, and bassoons. The piccolo, cor anglais, bass clarinet, E-flat clarinet, and contrabassoon are commonly used supplementary woodwind instruments.



The Brass Section

The brass family members that are most commonly used in the orchestra include the trumpet, French horn, trombone, and the tuba.




The Percussion Section

The most common percussion instruments in the orchestra include the timpani, xylophone, cymbals, triangle, snare drum, bass drum, tambourine, maracas, gongs, chimes, celesta, and piano.

The Movements of the Symphony

Each part fulfilling their individual score with skill and in order of directed timing, tempo and dynamics.

Types of musical movements

Complete musical works contain several movements, with three or four movements being the most common number of movements in a classical piece.

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Within the symphony there are four movements:

First Movement: Allegro con brio.

Second Movement: Andante con moto.

Third Movement: Scherzo. Allegro.

Fourth Movement: Allegro.

We are called upon to be of "one accord" and of "one mind." This was the characteristic of the early church, and ought to be the continuing norm of today. But, as we know, it didn't last long in the early church.

"What does it mean to be in one accord?"

The concept of being in one accord is expressed frequently in the Bible, with ten instances in the book of Acts. For example, "All these with one accord were devoting themselves to prayer, together with the women and Mary the mother of Jesus, and his brothers" (Acts 1:14, ESV). To be in one accord communicates being one in heart and mind.

More specifically, the words in the original language convey the inner unity (oneness of heart and mind) of a group of people engaged in a similar action. As such, the expression is sometimes rendered "with one mind," as in Romans 15:6: "So that you may glorify the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ with one mind and one voice" (CSB).

Source of Harmonious Wisdom

13 Who among you is wise and understanding? Let him show by his good behavior his deeds in the gentleness of wisdom.

14 But if you have bitter jealousy and selfish ambition in your heart, do not be arrogant and so lie against the truth.

15 This wisdom is not that which comes down from above, but is earthly, natural, demonic.

16 For where jealousy and selfish ambition exist, there is disorder and every evil thing.

The Wisdom from Above Section – James 3:13-18

- Hebrews 13:1-17, speaks of Sincere Love (v.1) and Encouraging Joy (v.17), which should characterize our fellowship in the local church....
- The believer uniquely lives in three relational realms...the believer's relationship with other believers, the believer's relationship with others in the world, and the believer's relationship with "those who watch over their souls." These three relationship are, of course, predicated on the most important relationship...the relationship with the Lord, Himself.
- According to our text, there are at least nine (9) relational priorities that flow out of these three realms...

HOLY HARMONY IN THE CHURCH Section Hebrews 13

RELATIONAL PRIORITIES

Hebrews 13 speaks to the body of believers to maintain certain relational priorities, including:

- 1. The Priority of Sincere [brotherly] Love towards all people (v.1)
- 2. The Priority of Hospitality [brotherly love for] of Strangers/Guests (v.2)
- 3. The Priority of Compassionate Concern for the maltreated (v.3)
- 4. The Priority of Moral Fidelity/Purity in Marriage and Family (all relationships) (v.4)
- 5. The Priority of Ethical Behavior with Contentment (v.5)

Confidence and trust in the Lord's provision and protection (v.6)

- 6. The Priority of Honoring God's Word and respecting (emulating) those who teach it (v.7)
- 7. The Priority of Christ-centered Worship (v.8-13) the unchanging Christ/unchanging truth. Spiritual stability in an unstable, confusing religious world Christ Jesus is our example for service and pattern for worship
- 8. The Priority of Sacrificial Service unto the Lord (v.14-16)

Only an eternal perspective – rather than an earthly focus – can bless a ministry

The church offers something better, far superior, than earthly cultural attractions

9. The Priority of Obedience to God's Word by submission to God-directed authorities (v.17)

Holy Harmony through Relational Priorities

Hebrews 13:1-17

LOVE ONE ANOTHER

- There are 59 "one another" statements in the New Testament.
 Exhortations in scripture to actually "do" something towards another person.
- Unity. One third of the one-another commands deal with the unity of the church.
- Love. One third of them instruct Christians to love one another.
- O Humility. About 15% stress an attitude of humility and deference among believers.
- General Kindnesses, courtesy and holy affection

One Another Section

"One another" is two words in English, but it's only one word in Greek: ἀλλήλων (ah-LAY-loan). It's used 100 times in 94 New Testament verses. 47 of those verses give instructions to the church, and 60% of those instructions come from Paul.

- The research provides little evidence for the existence of natural talent. In every domain, from chess to sports, world-class performers have spent at least ten years dedicated to improving, chalking up 10,000 or more hours of practice.
- oSome of the best research deals with musicians. In a famous study, researchers went into a violin academy in Germany. Their assumption was that if natural talent exists, they should be able to find topperforming students who didn't or hadn't practiced as much as the others. The researchers consulted experts to make judgements about the performance level of the violinists, putting them into three groups: the highest level solo performers, average-level solo performers, and music teachers mostly aspiring to become solo performers. The researchers found that the top group had practiced significantly more than the second group, which in turn had practiced more than the third group. The key was accumulated lifetime practice. The more practice, the better the performers.
