- II. The character of an shepherd
  - A. Character is the primary qualification for a shepherd!
  - B. A shepherd's character should be proven in other settings
    - i. above reproach no one "has anything on you"
    - ii. husband of one wife (a "one woman man")
    - iii. manages household well
    - iv. respectable
    - v. not a recent convert
    - vi. good reputation with outsiders
  - C. An overseer should be able to handle conflict in the right way
    - i. not violent but gentle
    - ii. not quarrelsome
    - iii. not willful/arrogant
  - D. An overseer should be able to control himself, and not be controlled
    - i. temperate
    - ii. not given to wine (1 Timothy 5:23; Proverbs 31:4-7)
    - iii. not a lover of money (Hebrews 13:5)
    - iv. not quick-tempered
  - E. Positive traits and habits
    - i. hospitable (1 Timothy 3:15)
    - ii. able to teach (2 Timothy 2:24)
    - iii. loving good (Philippians 4:8)
    - iv. just/righteous/upright
    - v. holy (1 Timothy 2:8; Hebrews 7:26)
    - vi. self-controlled
    - vii. disciplined (lit. empowered cf. 1 Corinthians 9:25)
- III. Who is equal to this?
  - A. These are the qualifications for a shepherd of God's flock
  - B. Jesus is our Shepherd and he exercises his rule for our good
  - C. We are accepted through the shed blood of the Shepherd and he is able to change us into the kind of people fit to serve him (Romans 16:25,27; Ephesians 3:20-21; Jude 24-25)
