<u>Introduction</u>: Where would you go with this sermon text? What would you say to a people who largely knew what they are supposed to do, but who are also very aware of their failures to do so? - Resolve? Technique? Duty?

- How would you approach someone in pastoral oversight visit who had been frequently encouraged, yet little progress? – Is this "Mission Impossible?"

THREE BASIC COMMANDS (vv.16-18a)

- The **basic meanings** are clear
- 1.) Rejoice To enjoy a state of happiness and well being, delight, satisfied; opposite of joylessness, unsatisfied, grieved
- 2.) Pray Talking to God to receive help opposite of prayerlessness
- 3.) Give thanks to be internally grateful and express it opposite of ungrateful, complaining, grumbling
- These are all to be **pursued** (indicated by imperatives) not God mystically giving
- These are all to be **constant** (indicated by adverbs) not occasional
- These are all to be with the hear not just words

Two Objections

1.) These commands are not viable because of the reality of life

- Doesn't living in a fallen world negate this possibility
- Perhaps a hyperbole exaggeration for emphasis or effect
- Even by this standard (of frequency), we should ask if we measure up
- 2.) These commands are not viable because of other biblical commands
- How can we obey the commands to sometimes lament and mourn for our sins (<u>Jam4:9</u>), to weep with others' in their trouble (<u>Rom12:15</u>), to be angry (<u>Eph4:26</u>)?
- There are certain emotions that are a part of who God has created us to be can we do them at the same time?

THE FUNDAMENTAL REASON FOR THESE COMMANDS (v.18b)

For this is the will of God

- We start with the reality that this is "the will of God" – God's commands and what is required

In Christ Jesus for you

- This is more than the mere law of command, but specifically rooted in the person and work of Jesus Christ – Jn15:5

THE APPLICATION OF THAT REASON TO THESE COMMANDS

- How do we take this "in Christ Jesus" reality and apply it so as to see progress in our lives?
- Our tendency is as thing go well, our rejoicing and thanks increase, but our earnestness in pray decreases
- Or when things are difficult, our earnestness in pray increases, but our rejoicing and thanks decrease
- Paul's direction is for all of them to be true and increasing at all times
- If these are to be accomplished, it is clear that it will not and cannot be based on temporal circumstances
- There will also have to be something transcendent, something presently unseen and not yet experienced
- In Christ Jesus as our example 1Pet4:1-2 arm yourselves with the same mind (Heb12:2)
- The cross of daily living is embracing the suffering created by living in a fallen world as the will of God
- The summary is that these are done <u>in faith</u>, not based on what we see, but on what we cannot see that God has promised the sufficiency of the Lord Jesus is indicated by our faith in Him

Faith in regards to:

- The Past who God has always been, what God has done
- <u>The Present</u> peace and reconciliation with God, opportunities to display the excellence of Jesus Christ, God using all things for my good to make me like Christ,
- The Future the removal of these difficulties at Christ's return, future reward
- Christian meditation, prayer, singing, worship are all the efforts of working these truths into our souls
- These three (rejoicing, praying, thanksgiving) taken together are really the **essence of worship**
- The *primary place* this is to be pursued is in *private*, before God
- It is then the overflow of what we are in private as our heart is changed that it flows out into our conversation and life
- w/o Christ, realities of your past, present, and future to face before rejoicing, giving thanks, need to seek God
