- II. Saul is desperate. v. 3-6
 - A. Saul is surrounded by the Philistines. v. 4,1 29:1
 - B. Saul is overwhelmed by fear. v. 5 15:26 17:11 18:12,29 28:20-21 10
 - C. Saul seeks, but cannot obtain, divine direction. v. 6 9:9 22:5 23:6 30:7 Num. 12:6 Gen. 20:6 37:5ff Dan. 2:3ff Mt. 1:20
 - D. Why doesn't the LORD answer? 22:5,11-23 23:6 30:7 15:26 16:14 Ga. 6:7 Js. 4:2b,3
- III. Saul goes so far as to inquire of a medium (witch). v. 7-14
 - A. Saul seeks a medium (witch/necromancer). v. 7
 - 1. This proves that Saul's inquiry of the LORD was not sincere. v. 6
 - 2. The LORD had forbidden all pagan practice: seeking supernatural power or knowledge from Him. Dt. 18:11ff Lev. 19:31 20:6,27 Is. 8:19 29:4 II Ki. 21:6
 - 3. Saul, earlier in his reign, had sought to remove the mediums and spiritists. v. 3b
 - 4. This evil act is a cause for the LORD's judgment on Saul. <u>15:23</u> <u>I Chr. 10:13b</u>
 - B. Saul asks the medium at Endor to bring up Samuel from the dead. v. 8-11 15:23 Why does Saul want to speak to Samuel? v. 11 15:26-35 16:2
 - C. The medium appears to succeed in bringing Samuel up from the dead. v. 12-14 Why is she frightened? 15:27-28 Ps. 106:28
 - D. Is this really Samuel? I Chr. 10:13
 - 1. The text says that he is Samuel and he certainly talks like Samuel. v. 15f
 - 2. God allowed this unique event for His own sovereign purpose. I Ki. 22:20ff
 - 3. Saul does not benefit. Rather, Samuel's words make his misery more intense.
 - E. Samuel offers no encouragement to Saul. v. 15 Pr. 27:14 Saul, as usual, rationalizes his sin. v. 15b 13:8-14 15:13ff
 - F. Samuel gives Saul the bad news: a fearful expectation of judgment. v. 16-19 He. 10:27
 - 1. The LORD has departed from you and become your enemy. v. 16 16:14
 - 2. The LORD is fulfilling the prophecy that the kingdom would be torn from you and given to your better neighbor (David). v. 17 <u>15:26-29</u>
 - 3. Your judgment is fully deserved. v. 18 15:1ff I Chron. 10:13-14
 - 4. Tomorrow Israel will be defeated and you and your sons will die. v. 19 31:1ff
 - 5. This is very similar to the prophecy of judgment given to Eli. 3:11ff
 - 6. Saul's death by the Philistines is an act of God's sovereign judgment. Isa. 10:5ff
 - G. In what sense would Saul join Samuel? II Sa. 12:23 Ps. 49:15 Is. 49:15 Lu. 16:19-31
 - H. Saul's last supper. v. 20-25
 - 1. Once mighty Saul is a terrified and broken man. v. 20 Ps. 104:29 Isa. 13:8 21:3
 - 2. The medium gives him a meal fit for a king. v. 21-25

IV. Application: How much are we like Saul?

A. Where do you turn when you are in distress? Js. 4:2b-3 When push comes to shove, do you submit to God or do what is expedient? v. 15b 13:8-14 15:13ff

B. Don't mess with what God has forbidden or hidden. Deut. 29:29

- 1. Not all spirituality is equally valid. Isa. 46:9
- 2. Many dabble in the occult: astrology, ouija boards, fortune telling, palm readings, seances, witchcraft, New Age crystals, tarot cards etc. Is. 47:13 Dt. 18:9ff
 - a. Many are shams, but some may have real demonic powers. <u>I Co. 10:19-20</u>
 - b. Some of us were led astray by such things before we were converted. I Co. 12:2
 - c. When we were converted we repented of these evil practices. <u>Acts 19:19</u>
- **3.** Is it wrong to read books, watch movies, or play games about witchcraft and magic?
- 4. Do we need to learn more about demonic powers? II Pe. 1:3 Dt. 29:29 Js. 4:7 Ro. 16:19 I Co. 10:19-20
- 5. Some professing Christians try to manipulate God in a way that resembles how pagans try to control their deities. Acts 18:9ff 19:11-17
- 6. Some professing Christians are led astray because they seek extra-biblical supernatural experiences and knowledge. Deut. 29:29 Jer. 23:25,28
- 7. God guides us through His infallible and sufficient Word. II Ti. 3:16-17 II Pe. 1:3
- C. Seek the LORD while He may be found. Isa. 55:6
 - 1. Don't continue to resist God lest you be hardened beyond recovery. v. 6,15b Heb. 3:8,15 Ps. 68:18 Mark 4:20-25 John 2:23-25 Luke 16:25-26
 - 2. Sometimes the LORD temporarily hides His face from believers so that they might repent anew and enjoy restored fellowship with Him. 30:6b Ps. 13:1ff 30:7
- V. Conclusion.
 - A. Where do we see Christ in this text?
 - 1. Jesus also knew the day of his death in advance. John 17:1 Mt. 26:36ff
 - 2. Jesus had a significant last meal (which is in stark contrast to Saul's).
 - 3. Jesus too was forsaken by God. v. 15b-16 Ps. 22:1 Mark 15:33-34 Isa. 53:4ff
 - B. What will you experience in your hour of great need? Isa. 13:8 21:3 55:6 I Th. 5:3
