# Abiding Applied John 15:4

Reading: 1 John 2:1-6

From Rosscup, Abiding in Christ, Chap. 14 – "Putting it all Together."

Bethany Baptist Church September 6, 2017 (p.m. service) Here is a very brief review: "abide" means "remain in" or "live in."

Abide is a verb, which means it's an active idea.

Jesus said, in John 15:4, "Abide in Me, and I in you." So finally, to abide in Christ is a command for every follower of Christ.

#### In fact, let's read John 15:1-11 together.

We began to *apply* Jesus command the last time we read these verses, let's dig deeper into *how* we obey His *call to abide*.

# "How do I begin to abide?"

- 1. Let's start w/ a *theological certainty*. Every believer is *in Christ*. That's almost *short-hand* for the Christian life.
  - a. The **NT** *teaches* that the work of the Spirit is to place into Christ (*baptism of the Spirit*) at the time of *rebirth*.
  - b. But the *quality (degree) of your experience (sense)* of your relationship varies.
  - c. I know that exploring Christian *experience* or *sense* makes some people *uneasy* (incl. *me* at times), but we all think about these ideas and we all long to *know w/ certainty* that we are *walking in close communion w/* Him.
- 2. Abiding might be said to grow out of *three* key activities of faith: relating, rejecting & receiving.
  - a. You *abide* as you consciously *relate* your daily experiences (*good* & *otherwise*!) to *Christ* and your relationship to Him.
    - i. What *biblical principles* do you know that relate to *walking* with Christ? Apply them, obey them.
    - ii. See His hand at work. Speak with Him in prayer.

- b. You *abide* as you carefully *reject* worldly, *fleshly attitudes* that rise up to *tempt* you.
  - i. Sin grieves & disbelief quenches His Spirit.
- c. You abide as you receive His promises.
  - i. How about this promise: "And lo, I am with you always."
  - ii. Or this: "I will never fail you or forsake you."
- 3. Relating, rejecting & receiving. ... It's only 3 ideas, but they might seem difficult to implement while you juggle the rest of your life...
  - a. Do you remember how overwhelming it was to learn to drive a car?
  - b. Sorting out all the tasks and then developing the proper techniques for doing them?
    - i. How much brake & how soon. Same with the gas.
    - ii. What's all this stuff on the dash? Knobs, dials, lights, gauges...
    - iii. Then there are all the other cars!
    - iv. "What you want me to drive backwards!?!"
  - c. But soon you were able to drive w/o *constant* thought.
  - d. So just *trust* Christ as you *obey* what you know to do, and then *trust* that He is present. You will *abide* ...
- 4. These principles of *abiding* absolutely work for a new Christian, but as you *mature* in Christ *abiding* grows (*deepens*) even more.
  - a. Again, don't forget the *essential* role of Scripture in growing and experiencing. Look carefully at **v.7** "If you abide in Me, and My words abide in you…"
  - b. And don't forget that Jesus teaches (**v.2**) that *growing* includes *pruning*.

### "Does abiding mean I'm always aware (sensing) of Christ's presence?"

- 1. In one sense, you might say "yes," as you look back over your life and you trace how Christ has always guided & protected you.
  - a. (Perhaps you might think of the famous *Footprints in the Sand* poem.)
  - b. And certainly if He's been w/ you *every step in the past*, He's with you *now*!
- 2. But it's simply true, *moment by moment* you may not be aware of Him ("sense" that you abiding).
  - a. That's usually because the *responsibilities & circumstances* of the day may require your *full attention*. This is *not* wrong.
  - b. Though it could also be true that sin has grieved the Spirit (this *is* wrong)!
  - c. **G. Campbell Morgan** illustrated this reality by describing his love for ihis love for his wife, **Annie**. His love for her was *constant unabating*...
  - d. ... but he simply couldn't think of her with **every** *thought* & *breath*. Life& ministry had their *undeniable* demands on his limited attention.
- 3. But...when nothing else *demands* your attention, where do your thoughts go tend to go...? And when your *soul* has questions, who do you *ask* simply *yourself*, or your *Savior*? Do you *talk to yourself*, or do you *commune w/ Him*?
  - a. Dr. Rosscup writes: Even in the thick of all those activities, his life is permeated by Christ so that he often **thinks** of Him, **communes** with Him in the heart's affections, **prays** for guidance, **lives** for His glory. He learns that the busy work of the day need not intrude a hair's breadth between him and Christ but may itself be filled with Christ with whom he may **share everything** in life. Rosscup (175)

#### "Where else is abiding taught in Scripture – is this really that essential?"

- 1. Abiding is synonymous with walking, being filled, growing (maturing). To abide (live life) in Him is clearly not an isolated or peripheral **NT** concept.
- 2. Consider the writings of the Apostle John. He never forgot Jesus' story, as this principle of *abiding* was prominent when he wrote 1 John almost **60** years later.
  - a. So in 1 John 2:28 we read Now little children, abide in Him, so that when He appears, we may have confidence and not shrink away from Him in shame at His coming.
- 3. Abiding is being filled with the Spirit (Ephesians 5:18b).
  - a. To be *Spirit filled* means to be *controlled & powered by* the Holy Spirit. Consider these similarities of the *Spirit-filled life* to the *abiding life*:
  - b. The Spirit bears His fruit in us (compare to John 15:2, 4, 5, 8, 11).
  - c. The Spirit *leads us* (compare to the idea of *living with* or *remaining with*).
- 4. Similar truths accompany **NT** teachings on walking in the light ( ..worthy of the gospel, ...and in love, ... circumspectly, ... in wisdom).
  - a. Walking is a common metaphor that suggests lifestyle. Abiding means to live in, to remain in. **NT** is just using **two** difference illustrations (abiding & walking...vine, light)
  - b. And walking in the Light (Jesus is the Light of the World) is essentially the same as abiding in Christ&being Spirit-filled& growing.

- 5. While we've touched on this already, let me point out that with all of these pictures, one of the constant & essential themes here is *fruit*. *Life with Jesus bears fruit*.
  - a. Jesus said, "He who abides in Me and I in him, he bears much fruit, for apart from Me you can do nothing." (Note: vv.2, 4, 5, 8)
    - i. In the Vine & Branch picture, the Lord promises you the fruit of *love* (9-10) & *joy* (11).
  - b. Paul writes about the *fruit of light* (Eph 5:9) & the *fruit of Spirit* (Gal 5:22, 23). Which, by the way, include *love* & *joy*! ☺
- 6. Abiding = being Spirit filled = walking ... all of which include the idea of maturing or progressing.
  - a. The good news is that the new Christian (babe in Christ) can still abide, walk, be filled.
    - i. Relating& rejecting & receiving all work for the recent convert.
  - b. The even better news is that the maturing Christian will experience communion with Christ in ways that ever richer & deeper & warner!
  - c. Both *new & mature* Christians will *abide*, but the outcome is more *fruitful* in the mature (→ more spiritual *self-control*, *capacity*, *sensitivity*).
    - i. It's kind of like weightlifting....
    - ii. When you start perhaps you can *sweat* & *strain* and benchpress **100** pounds. Six months later you *strain* & *sweat* and put up **150** pounds.
    - iii. Whether on the *first day* or then **six** months *later*, you are using the same techniques & giving it your *all*. But it just gets *better*.
  - d. So we can all grow *deeper*, *richer*, *fuller* w/ Him, and we should expect to experience this *closer abiding* as we grow.

# Gal 5:25 – if we live in the Spirit, let us also walk in the Spirit. 2X

- 1. Paul is putting *theology* in context w/ *application*...
- 2. I.e., this *abiding theology* (*live in the Spirit*) doesn't just *happen* **w/o** your *participation* (*walk*) ... so *strive* that your *practice* & *experience* measure up to your *theological* position.
- 3. So, as we go, take these **three** key words: *relate* (everything in life to Christ), *reject* (temptation that threaten to interrupt abiding), *receive* (*trust* Jesus' promises that you can *abide* in *Him*, that He is w/ you always).
  - a. Each one requires faith. You must trust Jesus to abide you as you seek to abide in Him.
- 4. No Christian wants to have *a superficial relationship* w/ Jesus! No Christian *needs* to!
