 Let's dive right into one of the major New Testament passages in which our Lo mands his forgiven followers to forgive one another — Luke 17:1-10. 		
	A.	The Lord's commands:
		(1) "If your brother sins, rebuke him"
		(a) Why must you go to him/her?
		(b) Two kinds of " <u>rebuke</u> " — which are you to use here?
		(c) What is your <u>attitude</u> in going?
		(2) "and if he repents, forgive him" More about this as this study unfolds.
		(3) "and if he sins against you seven times in the day , and turns to you seven times, saying, 'I repent,' you must forgive him."
	В.	The <u>disciples' excuses</u> :
		(1) This kind of forgiveness requires <u>more faith than I have</u> .

	(2) This kind of forgiveness is "above and beyond the call of duty."
	(3) Forgiving when you don't feel like it is insincere/hypocrisy.
2.	It's time to <u>consider your current relationships</u> in the light of what we have learned from Jesus in Luke 17.
3.	Refusal to forgive is a decision for <u>vengeance</u> (cf. Luke 17:2). It is taking <u>the right to judge and condemn</u> into your own hands. You are putting yourself <u>in the God's place</u> (Gen. 50:19).
4.	Conclusion:
