Reading: Romans 2:1-11; 15:1-7

Singing: 50:1-3 – 284:1-3 – 206:1-5 – 96:1-4

Opening Observations

- God's patience is often mentioned together with His mercy and grace (Ex. 34:6-7; Num. 14:18; Ps. 103:8; 145:8)
- ➤ God's patience is excellency of God which causes Him to sustain great injuries without immediately avenging Himself
 - 1. His patience is the temporal silence of justice & speech of mercy
 - 2. Is such a God worthy to be served? (Jer. 10:6-7)
- Resist fiercely the interpretation that God's patience is an uncalled indulgence of sinners out of weakness or softness
 - 1. Such thinking contradicts the revelation of the Cross
 - 2. It also ignores the reality of an eternal hell
 - 3. His patience is the beauty of God as revealed in Ezek. 33:11

 Say unto them, As I live, saith the Lord, I have no pleasure in the death of the wicked but that the wicked turn from his way and live: turn ye, turn ye from your evil ways; for why will ye die, O house of Israel?

III. WHAT ARE OUR RESPONSES TO GOD'S PATIENCE TO BE?

- A. Begin with the worship of adoration praise
 - 1. One chief part of personal prayer life should consist in adoration
 - 2. Should not every day provide us multiple moments to extol God!?
- B. Follow up with repentance Rom. 2:1-5
 - 1. Why does God forbear with sinners like we (all) are!?
 - a. our description: 1-3
 - b. God's initial response: vs. 4
 - c. what happens when we ignore the riches of His goodness: vs. 5

- d. what will God do in the end: vs. 6-9
- 2. So why is God suspending delaying *His righteous wrath?* a. Is He ripening us for judgment or do we ripen ourselves?
- 3. God calls us *urgently to repent now if you will hear His voice* a. this can't be delayed
 - b. this must not be ignored: we sinned against an infinite God!

C. Pursue Imitation: Be like Him!

- 1. Rom. 15:1-5
 - a. Church in Rome is divided about trivial things
 - their ought to be agreement on the essentials but there is liberty in the non-essentials
 - b. both groups are to exercise *forbearance be like minded*
- 2. Col. 3:12-15
 - a. context is 'general'
 - living with fellow saints will be challenging before heaven
 - some have *character* issues that are hard to live with
 - many have to live with dents, scrapes, wounds of the past
 - b. Paul exhorted: *instead of disgust irritation harsh words put on*
 - see vs. 12-15
- 3. How can I ever become like this? How reach this 'fruit of Spirit?'
 - a. Be like Moses: 2 Cor. 3:18
 - b. Be patient: Rom. 15:4; Romans 5:3-5; James 1:2-3
