WLC Q. 59. Who are made partakers of redemption through Christ? A. Redemption is certainly applied, and effectually communicated, to all those for whom Christ hath purchased it (John 10:15-16); who are in time by the Holy Ghost enabled to believe in Christ according to the gospel. WLC Q. 64. What is the invisible Church? A. The invisible Church is the whole number of the elect, that have been, are, or shall be gathered into one under Christ the head (John 10:16). WLC Q. 52. How was Christ exalted in his resurrection? A. Christ was exalted in his resurrection, in that, not having seen corruption in death (of which it was not possible for him to be held) and having the very same body in which he suffered, with the essential properties thereof (but without mortality and other common infirmities belonging to this life) really united to his soul, he rose again from the dead the third day by his own power (John 10:18); whereby he declared himself to be the Son of God, to have satisfied divine justice, to have vanquished death, and him that had the power of it, and to be Lord of quick and dead: all which he did as a public person, the head of his church, for their justification, quickening in grace, support against enemies, and to assure them of their resurrection from the dead at the last day.

WLC Q. 186. What rule hath God given for our direction in the duty of prayer? A. The whole Word of God is of use to direct us in the duty of prayer; but the special rule of direction is that form of prayer which our Savior Christ taught his disciples, commonly called The Lord's Prayer. WLC Q. 183. For whom are we to pray? A. We are to pray for the whole church of Christ upon earth; for magistrates, and ministers; for ourselves, our brethren, yea, our enemies; and for all sorts of men living, or that shall live hereafter; (2 Samuel 7:29) but not for the dead, nor for those that are known to have sinned the sin unto death.

I. Biblical prayer

- It is humble (vs. 18)
- It considers the power of God (vs. 19)
- It remembers the sovereignty of God (vs. 19)
- It acknowledges that God is all knowing (vs. 20)
- It knows that God keeps His Word (vs. 21)
- It reminds us of God's own heart (vs. 21)
- It sees God's plan is for our instruction (vs. 21)
- It proclaims the greatness of God (vs. 22)
- It proclaims that God is the only God (vs. 22)
- It is rooted in God's Word (vs. 22)
- It reminds us of God's covenant faithfulness (vs. 23-24)
- It remembers the truthfulness of God's Word (vs. 25)
- It exalts the name of God (vs. 26)
- It comes from the heart (vs. 27)
- It asks for God's will to be done (vs. 29)
