Exodus 34; Lord's Day 5 RECONCILIATION ONLY BY SATISFACTION

- I. The necessity.
 - A. Reconciliation implies a friendship: God created a bond of intimate friendship between Himself and man in Adam.
 - B. God can bestow favor ONLY on those who have satisfied His justice.
 - 1. God cannot overlook sin, for then He would be unrighteous.
 - 2. If man is to have God's favor, it can only be in accordance with God's perfect justice (Ex. 23:7b; 34:7; Isa. 1:27).
 - 3. Salvation requires paying the full penalty for all sins and sinfulness AND by rendering perfect love each moment.
- II. The satisfaction of God's justice is impossible for us.
 - A. Our old man by nature constantly tries to find ways to earn the favor of God and of men.
 - B. But it is utterly hopeless for every sinner.
 - 1. First, our debt cannot be paid (even spending an eternity in hell for each sin).
 - 2. Second, hell does not earn favor; it only fulfills an obligation (like paying a bill).
 - 3. Third, our "good works" cannot satisfy God's justice for past sins and past guilt.
 - C. Also, no mere man could qualify as a proper substitute for us.
 - D. Nor can satisfaction be made for us by another creature!
 - E. It is truly hopeless to look to man for the possibility of reconciliation between God and man.
- III. God Himself provides the only possibility (Eph. 2:4,5).
 - A. The only kind of Mediator must meet three requirements (Matthew 1:23).
 - B. God does everything necessary for us, including satisfying His own justice.
 - C. Application.
