4. Fellowshipping, 1 Jn. 1:3; 2 Cor. 13:14; Rev. 21:3-7.

1 John 1:3

What exactly is conveyed in Scripture when our salvation in Christ is described as fellowshipping with God? The word for "fellowship" in the Greek is κοινωνία (*koinōnia*). Its primary meaning is that of communion. In a general sense, fellowship is a term used to denote a relationship of communion, togetherness, partnership, or commonness...

In light of this, what is Biblical Fellowship? What does the fellowship that is enjoyed by those who are members of the Kingdom of God have "in common"? Christ! The fellowship we enjoy with God- the fellowship into which we enter upon salvation- is based upon Christ. And so the fellowship we have with one another is based on the enjoying of Christ together (cf. 2 Cor. 6:14-16a; Phil. 1:3-5)...

2 Corinthians 13:14

As Paul closes this epistle to the Corinthians, he ends with this benediction in which God's grace, love, and fellowship are "wished" upon the believers at Corinth. See, Paul longed for these Christians to know more of God's love, understand more of Christ's grace, and participate more fully in the fellowship of the Holy Spirit...

Revelation 21:3-4, 6-7

This passage speaks of the incredible fellowship we someday will enjoy with God! That heaven is the time when God physically will dwell with His people speaks of an intimacy and closeness regarding our relationship with Him, communion, rich and abiding fellowship- as of a father to his son...

...in fact, think of it! What is THE main thing that compromises our fellowship with the Lord in this life? Sin! Right? Cf. Ps. 51:12a; Ps. 32:3-5...

*Point: Heaven is a place where we shall relate to God face to face as nothing less than sons/daughters and so love Him with a love untainted by sin!

*Where We Live

Henry Alford put it, "What rush of hallelujahs fills all the earth and sky! What ringing of a thousand harps bespeaks the triumph nigh! O day, for which creation and all its tribes were made; O joy, for all its former woes a thousand fold repaid! ¶ O then what raptured greetings on Canaan's happy shore; what knitting severed friendships up where partings are no more! Then eyes with joy shall sparkle, that brimmed with tears of late; orphans no longer fatherless, nor widows desolate." (*Blue Trinity Hymnal* #234)

5. Learning, Jn. 17:3.

*Note

- 1. Before we look at this passage, let me set it up. The first time a person discovers that God has ordained all things- that all that occurs in our lives is according to the counsel of His will- the question naturally arises: If God is in control of all things- and note that we are NOT saying here that God is responsible for all things- then why the fall? Why non-Christians? Why didn't God just disallow the fall, sin, etc?
- 2. Of the multiple responses we might give, let me give you one. If there had never been the fall, a forgiven sin, a curse from which to be rescued, then almost every attribute of God that we know of today would be unknowable to us (cf. Eph. 3:8, 10)...
- 3. In light of this truth, what do you suppose is the design behind salvation? What will we spend the rest of eternity doing? Learning more about Christ, God, and His glory! With that, notice the text...

John 17:3

Jesus describes salvation as an activity of "knowing" Christ and God. To appreciate this statement, we need to understand what is meant by "knowing" in the Bible. In the NT, there primarily are two words translated as "know"- and you probably could quote them…

-oiδα (oida): which refers to a fullness of knowledge. If I say "I know something" and I use this word, that means I know pretty much everything there is to know about it (cf. Rom. 1:21; 1 Cor. 2:12)...

-γινώσκω (ginōskō): which refers to a growing, relational knowledge (cf. Gen. 4:17; Amos 3:2; Mt. 7:23)...

...the word used here is γ ινώσκω ($gin\bar{o}sk\bar{o}$) from which we conclude that eternal life/salvation is nothing less than a love-relationship with Christ that is ever constant and increasing. And more in keeping with the point here, it is a growing in one's comprehension, understanding, and knowledge of Christ.

That is the purpose of our time here on the earth, and that is the activity with which we shall be consumed in Glory...

As Thomas Boston put it, speaking of the child of God in glory, "Yet the saints can never have an adequate conception of God: they cannot comprehend that which is infinite. They may touch the mountain, but cannot grasp it in their arms... the divine perfections will be an unbounded field, in which the glorified shall walk eternally, seeing more and more of God; since they can never come to the end of that which is infinite." (*Human Nature in its Fourfold State*, p. 456)

*Note: Learning in Heaven???

"Perfect" defined- Heb. 5:8; Lk. 2:52

*Point: Heaven will be spent growing evermore in our knowledge of Christ! In fact, think of it: if we could know Christ completely, then He could not be an infinite God.

*Where We Live

- 1. If it isn't rather obvious, each of these activities are but the various expressions of one another...
 - a. Heaven will be spent WORSHIPPING God- and yet as we have seen, true worship flows from a right apprehension of God which therefore presupposes LEARNING.
 - b. And so, Heaven also will be a place of LEARNING. And yet, learning involves not only a growing in one's relationship with God- FELLOWSHIP- but also inquiry or investigation... CO-REIGNING.
 - c. And yet, all of these activities would be impossible without first being freed from the fear and curse of the Law- which implies RESTING.
- 2. So how will we spend the rest of eternity?
