God's reply, 4:4

Are you reconciled to God's will?

Have you forgotten God's mercy to you?

Do you know God as well as you thought you did?

## Tabletalk Questions For 9-5-10 sermon

"Angry at God" Jonah 4:1-4

What was the real reason behind Jonah's anger (4:1,2)? How do you respond/react when you don't get your way with God?

In what ways did Jonah experience/witness the LORD as "a gracious and compassionate God, slow to anger and abundant in lovingkindness, and One who relents concerning calamity"?

Why did Jonah ask for God to take his life (4:3,8)? Have you ever felt that way? How does God usually answer such unwise prayers?

What did God want Jonah to realize by His questions (4:4,9-11)? What lesson from Jonah's story will help you catch or keep God's heart for the lost?

Who are the "gentile enemies" in your world? What feelings do you have toward them? When, if ever, have you tried limiting God's mercy to others, or to yourself?

Compared to Jonah, how willing are you to take the Gospel to others? How about compared to Jesus?
