#### The Messiah Enters Jerusalem

Matthew 20:29-21:11; Psalm 118:19-29; Isaiah 42:1-9

# **I.** THE BLIND MEN SEE (20:29-34; Isa 35:5)

## A. The Condition of the Men

- 1. Blind (Lev 21:18; 2 Cor 4:4)—in darkness, disadvantage
- 2. Poor (Mat 5:3)—beggars by the road
- 3. Positioned (Ps 27:14 & 130:5-6)—in the right place waiting
- 4. <u>Listening</u> (Jn 20:29)—heard the news of Jesus and believed

# **B.** <u>The Cry of the Men</u> (30-31)

- **1.** Humility (Pr 3:24; Isa 57:15 & 66:2a)—acknowledge their need for His mercy.
- 2. <u>Faith</u>—(Isa 35:5 & 42:7; Lk 4:18)—know the Messiah can restore sight to the blind
- **3.** <u>Insistence</u>—no half-hearted, timid prayer!
  - a. They seize the opportunity. (2 Cor 6:2) Today if you hear His voice...
  - **b.** They <u>refuse</u> to be discouraged. (1 Sam1:12-17; Mat 15:22-28) Shame, fear, social pressure
  - c. They persevere until He answers. (Gen 32:26; Mat 7:7-8; Lk 18:1) Want it

# C. The Response of the Lord (32, 35)—merciful and gracious

- 1. He stopped for them. Jesus is never too busy to attend a soul in distress.
- 2. He encouraged them. (Heb 4:15-16) Jesus is gracious and kind to those who call.
  - **a.** He called them to Him. He grants us audience.
  - **b.** He <u>inquired</u> of them. He invites us to ask and is willing to listen.
- 3. He <u>pitied</u> them. (Ps 103:13; 2 Cor 1:3) Jesus' heart is engaged and willing to help.
- 4. He touched them. (1 Jn 1:1) Beauty of the Incarnation, personal connection of touch
- **5.** He <u>healed</u> them. (Ps 146:8) Jesus has the power to do what no one else can do.
- **D.** Their Response to His Mercy (34; 2 Cor 4:4, 6)—They followed Him.
- II. THE PROMISED KING ARRIVES (21:1-11)

#### A. His Ride—the donkey's colt

- 1. The <u>Fulfillment of Scripture</u> (4)
  - a. The Prophetic Word (Zec 9:9)—Zechariah's prophecy of the coming king
  - **b.** The Prophetic Type (1 King 1:33, 38, 44)—King Solomon's Coronation
- **2.** The <u>Significance</u>—a common, low and slow, humble beast of burden; not the proud steed of rich men and military generals
  - a. A Peaceful King (1 Chron 22:7-9; 1 King 1:29-40)—not a military conquest
  - **b.** A Gentle King (Isa 40:11 & 42:1-3; Mat 11:28-30)—to rule by love, not by force
  - **c. An Accessible King** (Eph 3:12; Heb 4:16)—even the poor, weak and timid can approach Him and keep up

## 3. The Miracle

- a. Jesus' supernatural knowledge—the details of location and condition
- **b.** Jesus' command of <u>animals</u> (Ps 8:6-7)—colt not broken, had never been ridden
- c. Jesus' command of human hearts (Prov 21:1; Ex 12:35-36; Ne 2:8)—the owner
- B. <u>His Reception</u>—spontaneous and improvised (human), but planned and symbolic
  - 1. The <u>Cloaks</u> (2 King 9:13)—placing themselves at His service, under His authority
  - **2.** The <u>Branches</u> (Ex 40:34, 35; Lev 23:40-43; Psalm 118:27; John 1:14)—feast of tabernacles
  - **3. The <u>Praises</u>** (Ps 118:25-27; Ex 12:3)—a Passover Psalm

The day Jesus enters Jerusalem is the day the Passover lamb was to be set apart.

- a. <u>Authority</u>—God's chosen Messiah, Israel's rightful king, heir to David's throne
- **b.** Salvation—Hosanna means "Save now!" (greater salvation than they understood)
- **c. Blessing** (Lk 2:14; Ph 2:9-11)—We bless Him with the highest blessing because He brings us the blessing and favor of God.
- C. <u>His Followers</u> (2 Sam 6:20, 22; Jn 7:48-49; 1 Cor 1:26-29)—*The common people; clergy & nobility notoriously absent*
