## Called to Feast

Matthew 22:1-14; John 6:27-58

## I. THE SYMBOLIC CHARACTERS

- A. The King—God the Father
  - 1. Salvation is His idea.
  - 2. He is generous.
- **B.** The King's Son—Jesus, the Bridegroom of the Church
- C. The Servants
  - 1. Old Testament Prophets
  - 2. New Testament Evangelists
- D. The Guests
  - 1. The <u>Original</u> Invitees (Act 13:46)—the Jewish Nation
  - 2. The Alternate Guests (Mat 8:11-12)
    - a. **Gentiles**—non-Jews, pagans
    - **b.** <u>Good and Bad</u>—not their own deserving but by faith in Jesus Christ
- II. THE EVENT SETTING (2)—Salvation as a Royal Wedding Banquet
  - A. <u>Salvation's Feast</u> (Jn 6:35)—food and fellowship
    - 1. It is <u>lavish</u>. (Ps 34:8-10)—plenteous, choice, beautiful, sumptuous and delicious
    - 2. It is <u>substantial</u>. (Isa 55:2)—real food, not snacks
    - 3. It is satisfying. (Ps 63:5; Isa 44:20)—this is what our souls crave
  - B. <u>Salvation's Romance</u>—A <u>wedding</u> Banquet, a celebration of love and relationship
    - 1. God is the <u>author of romance</u>. (Gen 2:22-25; Song of Solomon; Is 62:5)

- 2. Jesus is the romantic hero of redemptive history. (Jn 3:29; Rev 19:6-8 & 22:17)
- **3. Salvation is a <u>feast of love</u>**. (Song 2:4)
- **C.** Salvation's Invitation (3-4, 9)—Evangelism is inviting people to a party!
  - **1.** It is royal. It comes with authority.
  - 2. It is free. God paid for it.
  - 3. It has been prepared. God planned it.
  - **4. Come now.** (2 Cor 6:2). You must respond.
- **D.** Salvations Rejection (3, 5-6; Heb 2:3)
  - **1. They** ignored the summons. (passive rejection)
  - **2.** They <u>pursued</u> other things. (prioritize selfish distractions)
  - **3. They attacked the servants.** (actively insult)

## III. THE STORY'S CONCLUSION

- **A.** The Reality of God's Wrath (7, 13)—God is kind, generous and loving, but He is also holy and just. Love itself is complex and dangerous.
  - 1. For those who <u>reject</u> His offer of salvation
  - 2. For those who <u>presume</u> to come without Christ
- B. The Need for Appropriate Attire (11-12; Zec 3:3-5)—Christ's righteousness
  - **1.** Everyone is called to come and receive salvation. (Jn 3:16 & 6:37) The gospel invitation is for everyone, without discrimination.
  - 2. Only those <u>clothed in Christ's righteousness</u> will be accepted. (Is 64:6; Jn 3:18, 36) You cannot come on your own, apart from Christ.
