The Most Fundamental Concept

John 17.1-23

- A. We are in the world by the will of God. 17.1-15
- B. But we are not "out of" the world, and cannot be like the world. 17.16-23
- C. This reality has produced a great deal of tension in the Church.

Two actions are forbidden us

- A. One is an attempt to escape from this world
 - We cannot—Biblically—preserve our holiness by escaping the world
 - 2. Which, I would propose, is something that Fundamentalism has attempted to do. And the contemporary Church is critical of us for being "out of touch"
 - 3. But not just Fundamentalism: this is the mentality that drove much of the monastic (root idea: "mono," being alone) movement

- B. The other is conformity to the world
 - 1. We cannot contaminate our holiness by becoming like the world around us
 - 2. Which, I would propose, is something that has infected the contemporary Church movement. And Fundamentalism's criticism of the movement is that it's "worldly."
 - 3. But this isn't just a modern issue—its one as old as the people of God.
