Title: **Walking With God** - Lesson 7

Text: **Romans 6:4**

Subject:

- 1.) After salvation we should walk with Christ. - Colossians 2:6
"As ye have therefore received Christ Jesus the Lord, so walk ye in him"
- 2.) After Baptism we should walk in newness of life. - Romans 6:4
Like Christ we should go from dead to alive by the glory of the Father
- 3.) We are dead in sins by natural birth. - Colossians 2:13; Ephesians 2:1,5
- 4.) We are made alive spiritually by a new birth. - John 3:1-7
- 5.) When saved, we are new creatures with a new man and new nature. -
2 Corinthians 5:17; Ephesians 4:24; Colossians 3:10
- 6.) Put off the old man and don't go back to the old life -
Ephesians 4:22-23; Colossians 3:8-9
- 7.) Walk in the new spiritual life you have and never go backwards. - Romans 6:4
